On November 16th over 250 of FAVACA's friends and supporters converged upon the stunning [Norwegian Pearl](#) to celebrate 25 years of volunteer service and honor the founder and former Governor, Senator Bob Graham. The Senator was joined by family and enjoyed an afternoon full of memories and visions of the future as honored speakers shared their appreciation for [Florida's International Volunteer Corps](#) and the invaluable service it provides to the State of Florida and regional neighbors. Guests were treated to a four-course meal and enjoyed a special video presentation commemorating the past 25 years. The event's highlight was the presentation of

FAVACA's first "Lifetime Achievement Award" to Senator Graham and his heartfelt acceptance speech that received a standing ovation.

In appreciation for his commitment to the region, FAVACA commissioned a one-of-a-kind commemorative print of world renowned artist, [Xavier Cortada's work, "Mangroves \(at Sunset\)"](#). Mr. Cortada also presented Senator Graham with an original work from his Antarctic series as a token of thanks for Senator Graham's dedication to the environment. Senator Graham recognized early on that Florida is a Caribbean state and the importance of fostering healthy partnerships with countries in the region. To this end he created FAVACA in 1982 and the rest has been history.



HAITI HOSTS SECOND G3 CONFERENCE ON GANGS, GUNS & GOVERNANCE

While those polled in Port-au Prince recently believe there has been a sharp decrease in organized violence over the past six months, the threat posed to the region as a whole by increasingly structured gangs that often partner with their regional counterparts is undeniable. On October 24-27, 2007 the Interuniversity Institute for Research (INUR) held a research seminar on armed gang violence and urban transformation in Port-au-Prince, Haiti. The seminar focused on the idea that youth gang violence is not an issue that is limited to Haiti, but rather it also affects other countries throughout the Caribbean and Latin America. Affected by gang violence, and leaders in the region on the issue, Jamaica and Guatemala have been formulating research based intervention strategies and public discussions that ultimately inform citizens on public policies and civil society's involvement.

Haiti and other countries hope to adapt similar strategies to help eliminate youth gang violence. Participants in this seminar were collected from Jamaica, the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, El Salvador, Brazil, and the United States. [FAVACA](#) supported two volunteers to participate and add their expertise to this conference. First time volunteer Laura Kallus from Miami, Florida is the Executive Director of the PanZou Project Inc. an organization which provides gang prevention and intervention services to gang involved and/or high risk youths and their families especially for Haitian Americans.



Also a first time volunteer, Dr. Mikaila Brown, anthropologist and consultant for AOW Consultants Inc. added her expertise on development related projects such as researching best practices and helped explain methods that are currently being used in the field. Brown has done extensive research on the Jamaican diaspora repatriation and the socio-economic status and the effects on the development of self-perception and nationalism. Carolyn Rose-Avila, President of FAVACA, also attended this event.

FOCUS ON FLORIDA: FAVACA JOINS MY SAFE FLORIDA HOME PROGRAM

In an effort to maintain the strong community relationships FAVACA enjoys in South Florida, and in line with its long standing commitment to storm mitigation, FAVACA has joined ranks with the [My Safe Florida Home Program](#). The program, intended to fortify Florida homes against the devastating power of hurricanes, is made possible through funding provided by the [State of Florida](#), and is managed by the [Florida Department of Financial Services](#). [Volunteer Florida Foundation](#) is the administrator of the [My Safe Florida Home Nonprofit Program](#) which places its focus primarily on low-moderate income homes, and is the arm of the program where FAVACA will be doing work. From now through September of 2008, FAVACA has pledged to assist 1000 homes in making them hurricane ready by installing hurricane shutters at little or no cost to qualified homeowners. Living in Florida we know all too well the consequences of not preparing in time and FAVACA hopes to do its part in working towards a safer Florida.
